


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WELCOME LETTER

HISTORY OF BASKETBALL IN COUNTRY SOUTH AUSTRALIA

The first game of Basketball in Australia was played in Adelaide in 1897 between the YMCA and OBI. Within 10 years the YMCA had taken it to many towns in Country South Australia as part of its Physical Culture and Exercise Program.

Prior to WW1 strong basketball competitions were held regularly in Mount Gambier, Port Pirie, Peterborough and Terowie. On 29th June 1912 about 100 spectators watched visiting football team Sturt play Mount Gambier in Basketball at the Mount Gambier Boys Institute Hall.

By the late 1920's the game was being played in Port Lincoln, Cleve, Crystal Brook, Burra and many other towns, mostly in Memorial Halls, all with small dimensions and lowish ceilings. The Crystal Brook Council granted the use of the local hall to the YMCA for one night per week on the basis it was certainly in the best interest of the players, but some doubted it was in the best interest of the property. Elsewhere in the State, in 1926 the roller-skating rink in Cleve was turned into a basketball venue with regular weekly competitions. The Port Pirie YMCA team won the YMCA Australian Basketball Championships in Brisbane. Aldgate won the First Country Championships in 1939.

By the 1950's competitions were being held in many Country Towns such as Port Lincoln, Port Augusta, Kadina, Yorketown, Murray Bridge, Whyalla. Loxton and the Riverland were the standouts dominating the Country Championships.

In the late 60's and early 70's Basketball was booming in Country SA. Purpose built Stadiums were being planned and built in Port Augusta, Whyalla and Murray Bridge. One of the earliest Stadiums was built in Mount Gambier by association President Mr Bern Bruning.

In the early to mid-seventies, Mount Gambier Women's teams were the strongest Country teams in Australia winning both South Australia and Victoria Country Championships.

In this period of rapid growth, Country Basketball consisted of many volunteer run associations with regular competitions. Bern Bruning recognised that these associations needed a peak body. After intensive lobbying of the State and Australian peak bodies, the South Australian Country Basketball Council was formed. The inaugural members were Val Robson, Geoff Lovelock, Bern Bruning with Beth Serle OAM appointed as Secretary. Beth has remained a hardworking and dedicated Council Member for continuous years.

In 1974 the Basketball Federation of Australia sent an invitation to enter a team in the Under 16 Men Australian Championships. With only a month to organise a State Team, it was decided to enter the Mount Gambier U16M as the State Team.

In 1975 after a full year of organisation by Beth Serle OAM, Mick Osborne and John Spooner, a fully representative SA Country U16M team played at the Australian Championships. Three years later our first Women's team played in the U18 Australian Championships led by Bob Borman, with Carlene and Ivan McMahon.

Senior and Junior Country Carnivals became a focus for associations to compare standards and were also a major fund generator.

With Geoff Lovelock at the helm after Bern Bruning left for Sydney in 1975, the Council started to grow and exert more influence. With the appointment of Ted Powell as Country Development Officer major progress was made in the areas of skills development, camps and state team preparation. Ted's foresight, together with his counterparts in Victoria and New South Wales led to the formation of the Australian Basketball Country Cup to be held in Albury each year. SA Country input of two teams in each grade of both boys and girls saw many more junior players represent SA.

Bert Bargeus made very early contributions to the Australian Country Cup as a Director and then followed with a long list of professional contributions to SA Country.

Presidents David Hull, Leo Sheehan and Frank Clark played strong supporting roles during this developmental period with Beth Serle providing the administrative expertise.

Ray Cadd took over the Secretary role in the late 80's and then worked as commissioner of the South Australian Country Invitation Competition later to be known as SACIBall. This provided strong competition for association in a country state league. Some years later, Ray became President of the Country Council.

After Ted Powell left, the coaching success slowed down until Glen Mathieson started having success with his U16 girls team culminating in a Bronze Medal in 2000 at the U16 Girl's Championships.

Mike Williams followed in 2002 with a Silver Medal at the U16 Boy's Championships.

Neil Gliddon, SA Director of Coaching, played an important role in developing our elite players and state teams. Coinciding with this improving on court success was the appointment of Bert Bargeus as Executive Director. Bert was a hardworking volunteer and his move to the executive chair gave much needed expertise.

The appointment of Dean Kinsman to the position of Development Officer in the new millennium heralded a new approach to the teaching of Basketball skills. This appointment brought with it a new level of enthusiasm and excitement to coaching basketballers.

During this period we saw prominent association coaches step up to coach state teams with true professionalism – Glen Mathieson, Peter Seebohm, Jenny Herbert, Michael Rogers, Paul Salter, Trudy Ireland, Judy Prosser, Kym Hammond, Graham Semmens, Mal Penno, Peter Todd, Trevor Semmens, Matt Whittaker, James Murphy and Shona McKeon among others, brought knowledge, experience and professionalism to their state roles, in the same vein as earlier coaches Mike Osborne, Ted Powell, John Cadd, Graham Stringer, Neil Gliddon, Mike Williams, Roger Hammond, Frank Arsego, Wayne Beaumont, Jeff Fulwood, Noel Robertson, Nathan Jones, Paul Barton, Terry Casey, John Gillies, Bob Borman, Phil Smyth, Sonia Knight and Grant Surfield.

In 2006 a new structure emerged for Basketball SA. Over the next two to three years SA Country President Ray Cadd and Executive Officer Bert Bargeus supported by the Council Executive resisted Country Basketball being placed under the Basketball SA umbrella, with the result that SA Country today remains autonomous but required to pay affiliation fees for players to Basketball SA. The thrift and hard work by Bert Bargeus during this period have resulted in the strong financial position SA Country is in today.

Meanwhile other successes on the court followed Glen Mathieson's Bronze and Mike Williams Silver at the Australian Junior Championships.

The U16 Girl's won Silver in 2009 under coach Trevor Semmens and in 2013 won Bronze under coach Peter Todd

The U18 women won Silver in Ballarat in 2015 under the masterful coaching of Paul Salter and a Bronze in 2008 in Ballarat with Stephen Patterson as the coach.

The U16 Boys won Silver in 2001 in Adelaide with Mike Williams as coach and most recently a silver in 2023 in Perth, coached by Ben MacCulloch.

The U16 Girls won Silver at the Australian Championships in Darwin in 2021 with Ryan Byrne in charge.

In 2014 SA Country won both U14 and U16 Girls and Boys at the Australian Country Cup in Albury. There have been many other age Division wins before and since. SA Country are grateful to the many Coaches, assistant Coaches and Managers who have had considerable input into these successes.

The emergence of new well credentialled coaches has driven the growth in playing standards. These Coaches include; Ben MacCulloch, Mark Billington, Danny Millard, Dan Stratford, Ryan Byrne, Boyd Fitton, Dan Wray, Nathan Humphries, Lukass Blicavs, Ben Wigzell, Grant Keleher, Paul Harris, Lyndsee Frost, Lisa Drefke, Ash Wutke, David Todd, Matt Sutton, Mitchell Stanbury and many more. As well Kangaroo Island's Valda Pain has made a significant contribution.

SA Country owes much to the contribution of the Executive Committee, some of whom have committed decades of service such as Beth Serle OAM, Sharon Venn, Ray Cadd, Bert Bargeus, Graeme Stringer, Cathy Warren, Peter Seebohm and more. The longevity and hard work of Team Manager Roger Hammond resulted in a professional approach to team management.

History will note that the outstanding contributions of Beth Serle OAM and Bert Bargeus over many years have been the reason SA Country thrives today.




